Entering the theatre

In the theatre, people will sit beside, in front or behind you. There are 458 seats in the theatre and it may be loud as people find their seats. You may need to stand up to let people reach their seats in the same row.

- You will know the show is about to begin when you see someone standing by the front of the stage with a microphone. They will welcome you all to the theatre. If you are visiting with your school, this person will announce your school name. Often schools will clap or cheer when their school is mentioned.
- The show will then begin. The lights where you are sitting will get a little darker and the lights on the stage will get a little brighter. You might hear music or voices begin to speak. The audience will quiet down.

- When you go through the front doors you will see display cabinets filled with props and costumes from different shows.
- On the left will be a large glass window. This is the Box Office. Inside the Box Office are sales associates who are there to help you. Your teacher or parent might speak to them to let them know you have arrived or to pick up tickets for your class or family.
- You might be asked to line up in front of the main staircase. Other people will be arriving and it may become busy, crowded and noisy.
- When it is time to go into the theatre the Front of House Manager will stand on the stairs, introduce themselves and go through some basic rules of what to do when inside the theatre.
- An usher will then lead you upstairs or you may take the elevator.

Accessibility

Notes for parents, caregivers and teachers.

YPT endeavours to be accessible to all patrons. However, limitations imposed upon us by building design mean we cannot provide all the services we would like. We are working on methods to better serve patrons with all manner of disabilities and special needs.

Both performance spaces at YPT offer limited wheelchair seating. If you use a wheelchair or other mobility device, an usher will be on hand to help you into the theatre. Wheelchair spaces in the theatre can be booked by phone. Please call 416.862.2222 for more information and to make arrangements in advance of your visit.

If you are seeing a show in the Mainstage you will go through **this side door**.

You are now in the **green room** where you will enter the theatre through **another side door**.

If you are seeing a show in our Studio Theatre, an usher will escort you using our elevator. They will operate the elevator with a key and you will enter the Studio Theatre from the backstage door.

Support Persons who accompany a person with a disability will receive a complimentary ticket.

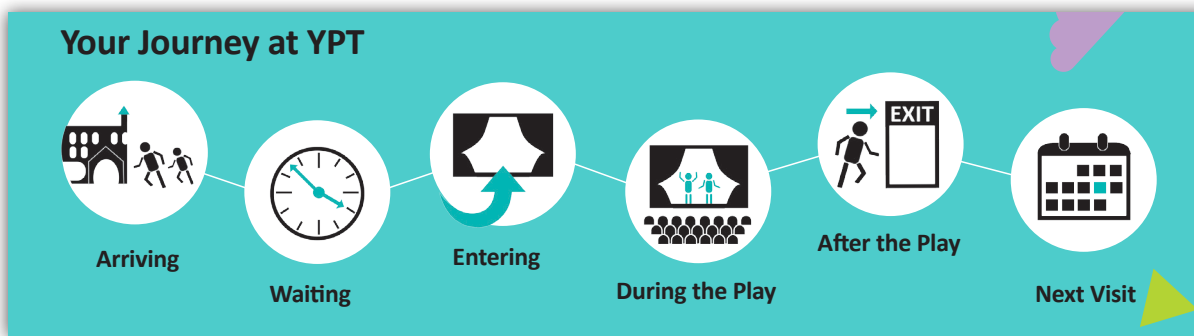

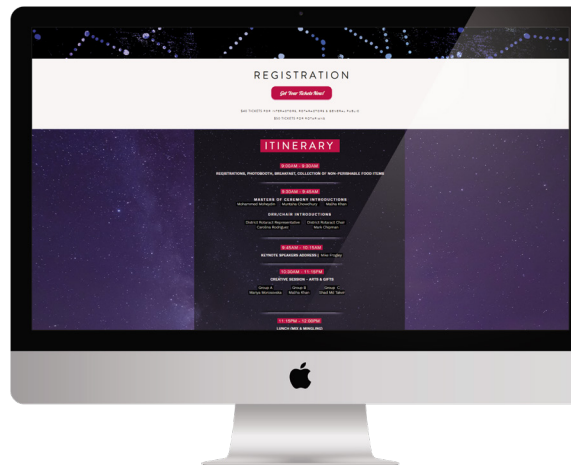

INDIGENizeUS

YPT CONNECTS WITH THE 7 ANCESTRAL TEACHINGS

INDIGENizeUS was a workshop series created by Lindy Kinoshameg. The entire staff of YPT participated in these workshops which focused on Indigenous relations, raising cultural awareness, and explored individual reconciliation. Our learning began around the seven sacred teachings of Respect, Bravery, Humility, Love, Honesty, Wisdom, and Truth. The intention behind the workshop series is to hear Indigenous oral histories, share stories, and participate in traditions first-hand. It is our hope that programs such as this will begin building a bridge between nations and help take the first steps toward reconciliation.

What is YOUR connection with these 7 Grandfather teachings?

Bravery

The power of the drum was shared by Veronica Johnny with the YPT staff. Veronica shared that drumming is a way to tell our story and to be a witness of our past. Our ancestors use to teach with drumming for their stories, gathering people to dance and hold the drums, to witness different songs together and share our stories as a people.

Honesty

Leslie McCue shared with us, the YPT staff, the stories behind the Women's Honouring Ceremony and how it was created. The Women's Honouring Ceremony is a traditional Indigenous ceremony that is held in honour of women and every movement used in the dance has a rich history and meaning behind it.

Love

Paul Ayayiyakshkeeth invited the YPT staff to undergo a surprise little more party and what it was like to be a "Canadian". The night of where we were and what we did was all about the first people, and the traditional, the love and respect, and the way we live together and how we move forward together in peace.

Wisdom

Dr. Dave Redford taught us, the YPT staff, about ancestral wisdom, respect, wisdom, and how to be a good person. He showed us how the seven sacred teachings of the land formed around the seven grandfathers teachings from this workshop, we learned that when speaking with any grandfathers it is important to ask ourselves "to it what?"

Respect

We, the YPT staff, participated in a meeting with Elder Pauline Shirt, where she shared her stories from a lifetime of living, listening, learning, and teaching. Our grandfathers and grandmothers used to be used to teaching, to the land, to the people, and to the land. The land is our grandfathers and grandmothers, and we are all connected to it. 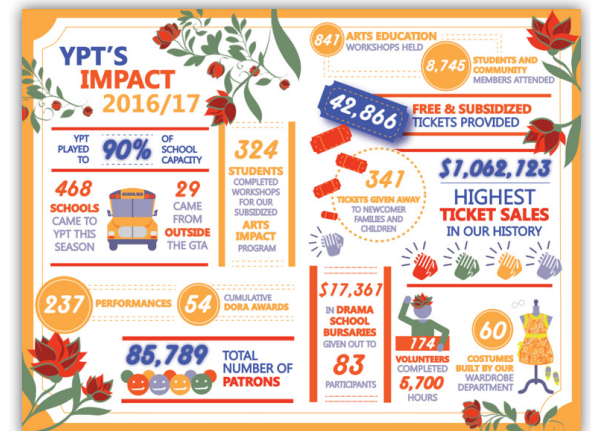
